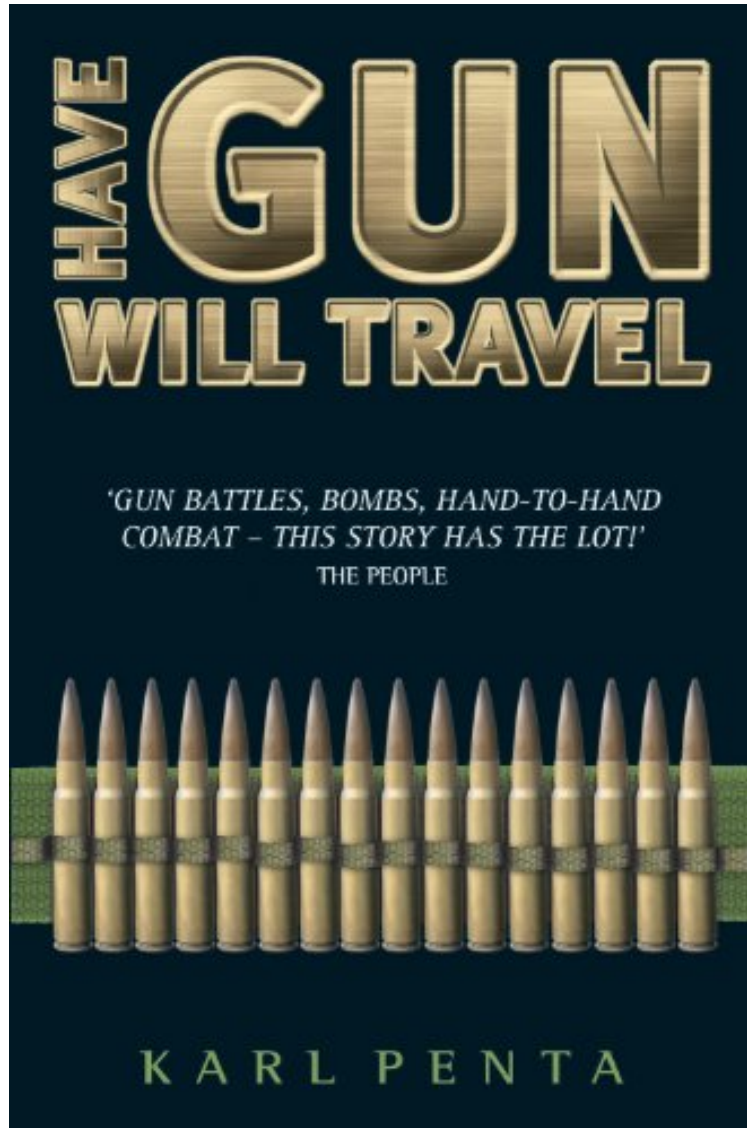

This would have gotten a 5-star except for the fact (IMO) that the writing is a bit dry as it (a) is the normal British style that I often see and (b) Karl is actually a pretty unassuming person - when none considers the scenario and situations and conditions faced.
