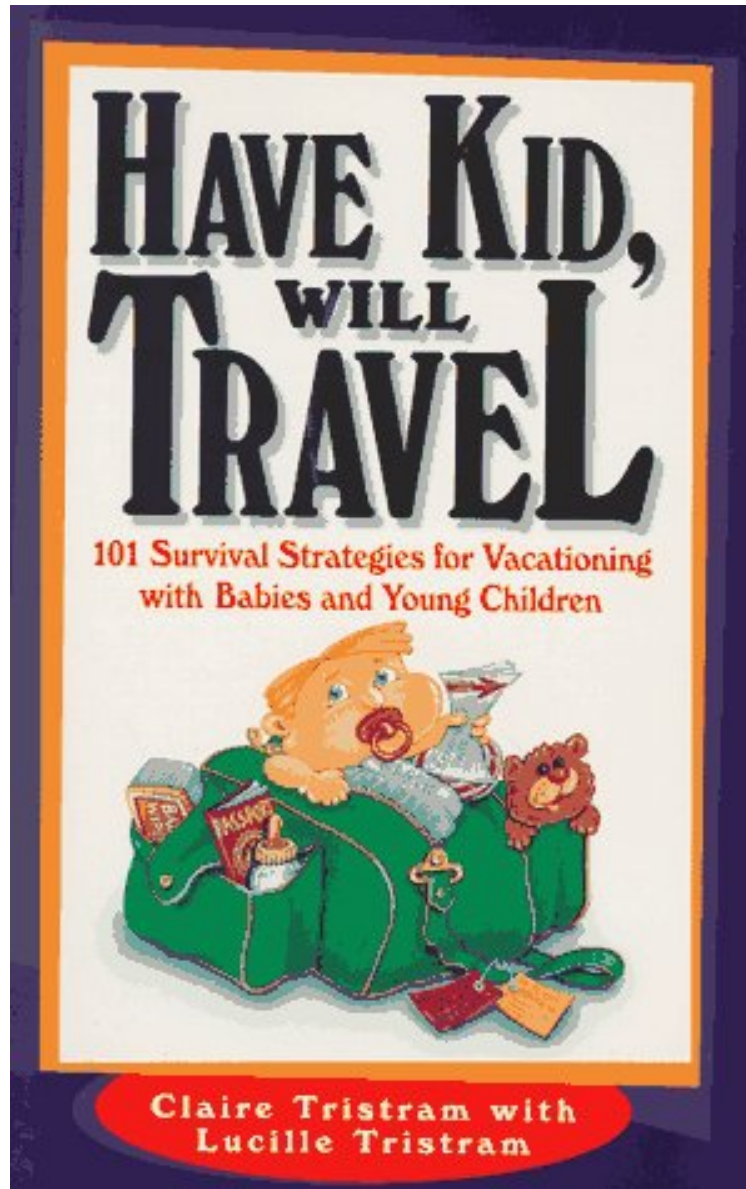

In addition to a wealth of practical advice about packing, transportation, entertainment, and meals, Tristram includes specific information about particular types of travel such as camping, backpacking, and international trips. Emergency situations, finding childcare while on the road, traveling as a single parent or with a special-needs child--all these topics and more are covered in Claire Tristram's invaluable book.
