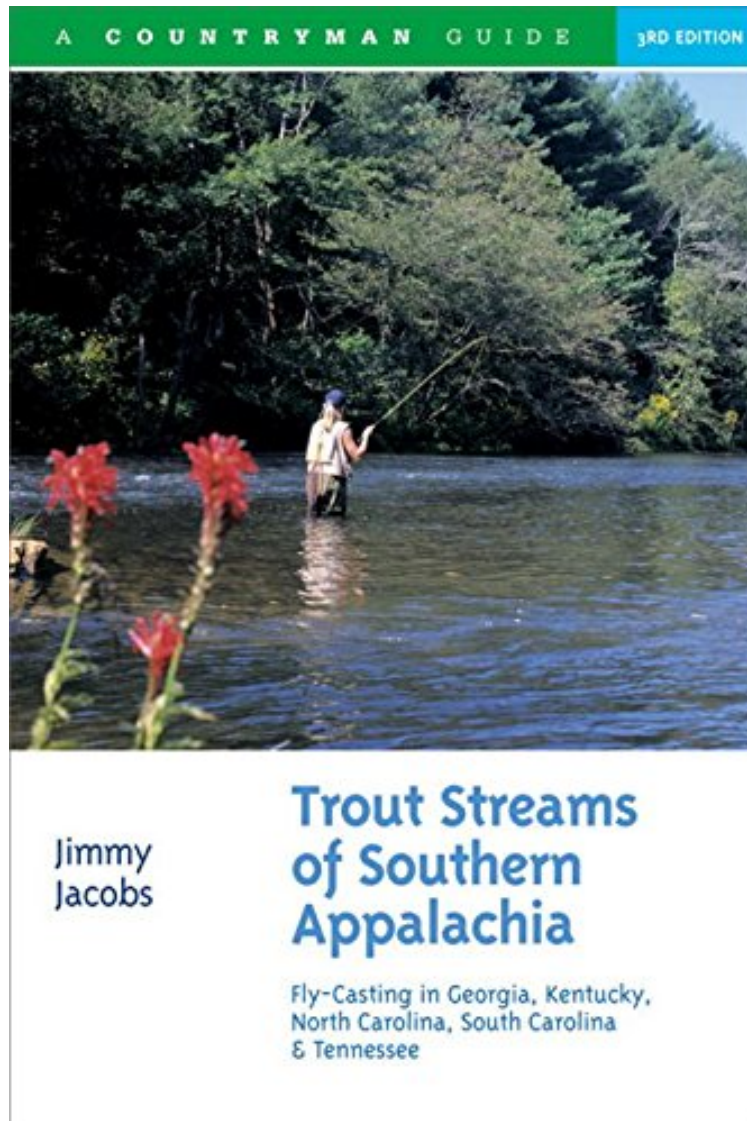

Worthwhile Resource and Inspiration for Fly fishing in WNCBy Bill(First, a caveat: I only know SOME of the trout streams in western NC, so I can only speak about that area.) I'd read an earlier edition of the book from the library, so I knew pretty well what its strengths were, and, after comparing the new editions with that one, I can see that there have been few updates that I can detect in the WNC section I've looked at. Nonetheless, the book is, for me, a very good resource for several reasons: 1. The simple black and white map pages wherein Jacobs gives you a great aerial view of each river system seem nonexistent anywhere else. 2. He gives excellent access info, and it's keyed to the Delorme atlas which is common as well as the USGS. 3. He sums up the pros and cons of streams, seemingly unafraid to give low ratings and his reasons for those ratings, i.e. Jacobs doesn't praise every stream as if he were a member of the states' tourist bureaus. If he skips over a stream or two, he tells you why, clearly explaining where the access is private and public. 4. Most of the streams I've visited confirmed his descriptions. The only reason I gave him a four instead of a five is that there is one little stream that I truly love and that offers a great deal to the trout angler that he dismissed. So, his evaluations should be considered ONE man's opinion. Mr. Jacobs has many streams to keep track of for this book, so it's quite understandable that there would be some different perspectives or the necessity of neglecting some areas simply because it's only human not to visit each one regularly. This book is ONE reference that will both get you excited to go to some new spots and give you more resources to consult about spots you already know or have heard about.
