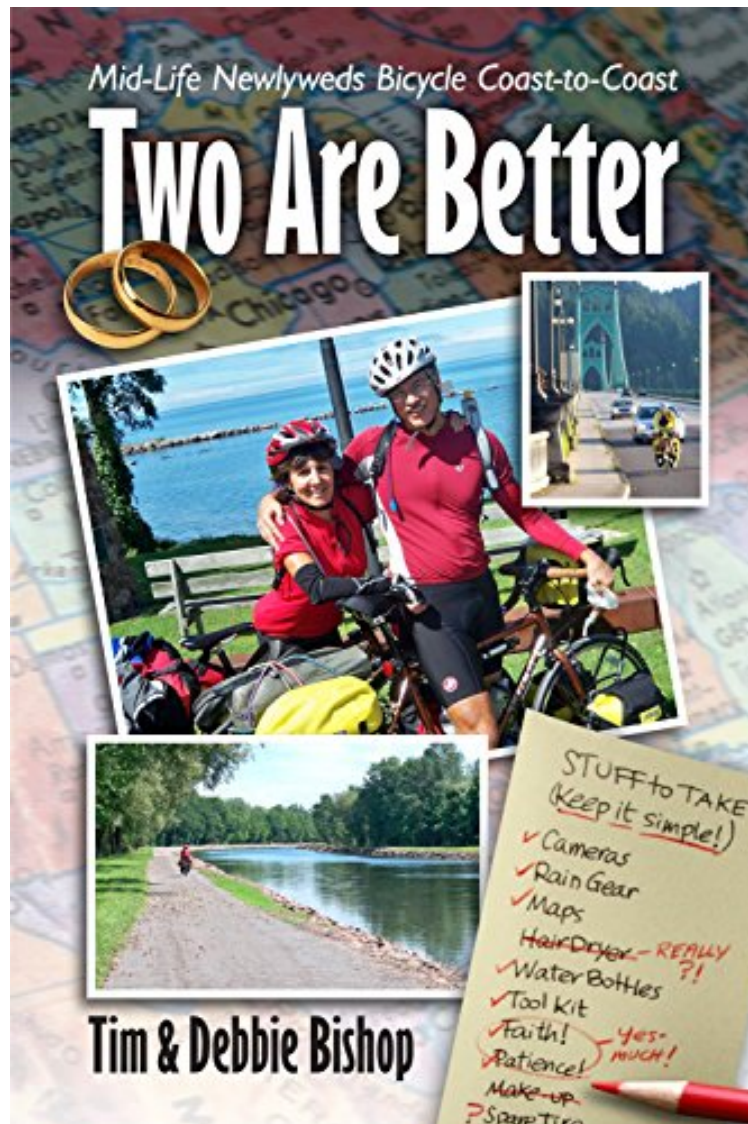

First, it is entirely too short. I read it in just several sittings. Why not write a little more about Indiana - the author devoted ONE paragraph to the entire state. Secondly, they lost lots of respect when they decided to hitch rides in several locations, including most of the state of Minnesota. They were very unprepared for the trip - neither of the two had ever patched an inner tube! And now their second published book is a How-To on bike touring. If you're looking for a book about bicycle touring, I'm afraid that you'll be somewhat disappointed. The book is more a love story - as a matter of fact, the first 21% of the kindle version is devoted to how the couple met. Another large portion of the book concerns how wonderful and fabulous his new wife is - it gets a little repetitious. Another large part of the book rambles on and on about his faith in God and his beliefs - not that there is anything wrong with that, but it's not what I expected to read.
