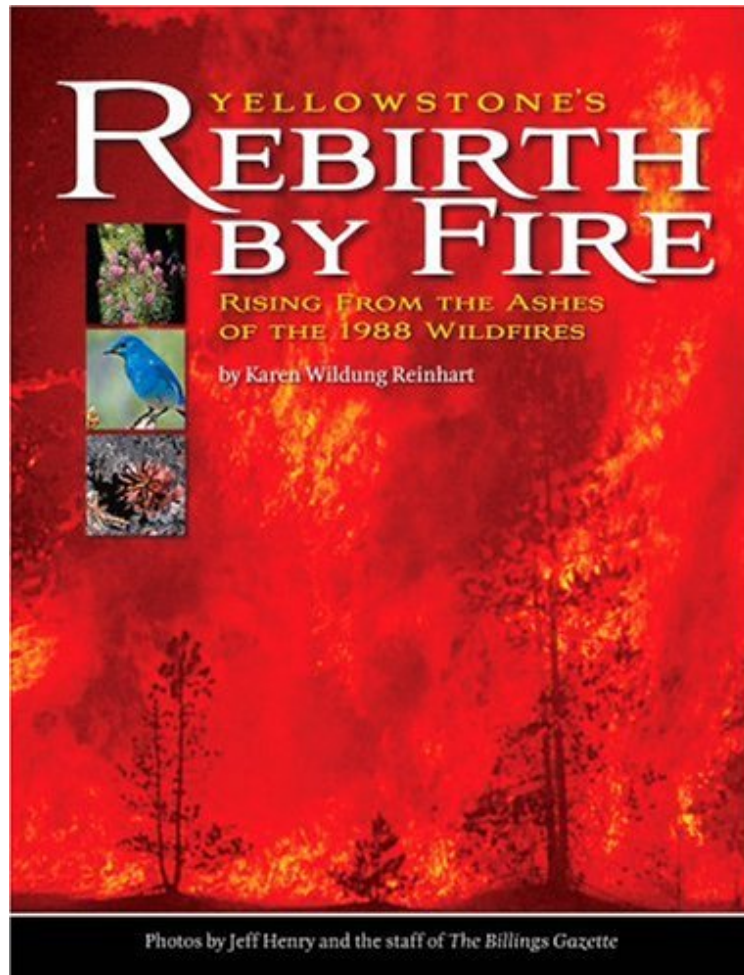

My favorite place in the whole world is the lobby at the Lodge at Yellowstone. The lodge was at risk and at the time the fire-fighters didn't know that they could save it. If you have gone thru the Julian, CA fires, it was the same sinking feeling. The fires came right up to the lodge. My room at the lodge is the

closest one to Old Faithful. When I grew up in the 50's the bears were still coming up to the cars. Yellowstone was being taken away from me. I was afraid to go there the next year, but there were those flowers that only pop out of the ash. And although there were just the brown stumps of trees, I was by water and was not in a place where the whole forest was devastated. The pictures of the 70's were not of professional stature, but because of that it took me to a time past when I was in my 20's.
